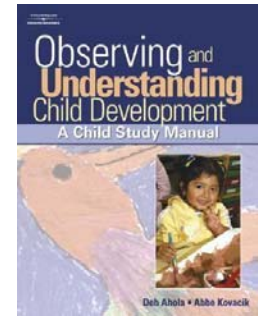
The Exceptional Child: Inclusion in Early Childhood Education (2004)

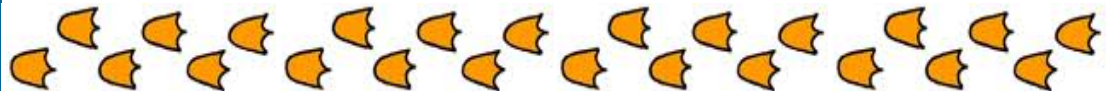
Child Development 3rd edition (2004)
