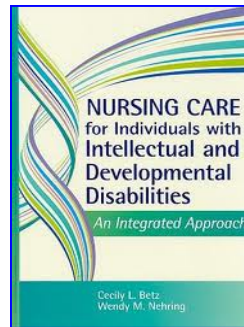

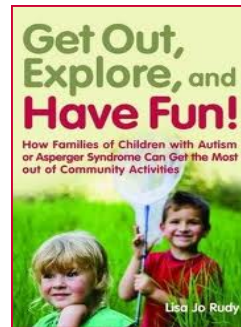

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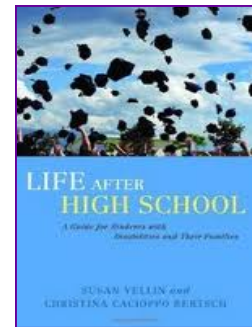
### **Nursing Care for Individuals with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (2010)**

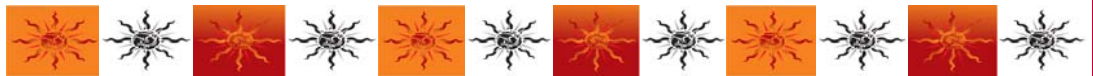
### **Get Out, Explore, and Have Fun! (2010)**

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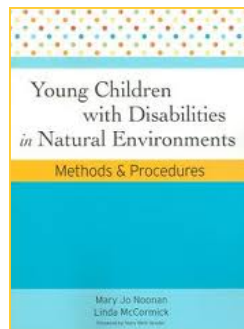

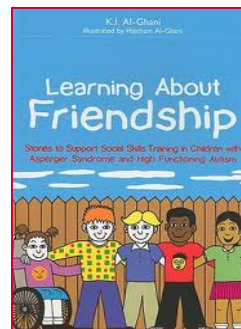

### **Young Children with Disabilities in Natural Environments (2006)**

— “With its comprehensive coverage of instruction and intervention practices in natural environments, this is the essential methods textbook for pre-service educators and therapists.
