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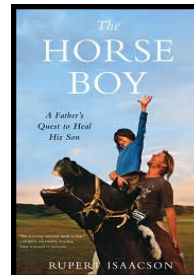
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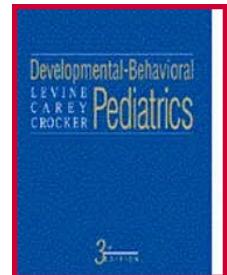
Effective Practices for Children with Autism (2008)

Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics (1999, 3rd edition)

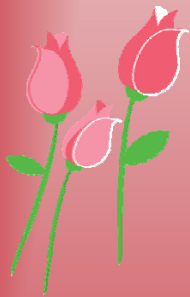
