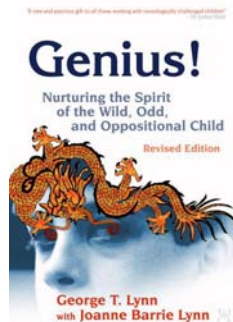

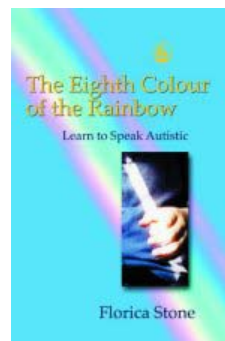

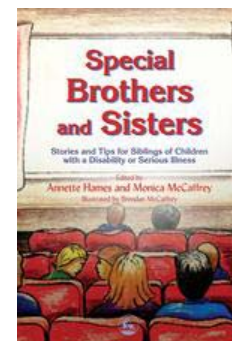
Genius! Nurturing the Spirit of the Wild, Odd, and Oppositional Child (2006).

Autism— The Eighth Colour of the Rainbow: Learn to Speak Autistic (2004).

— Shows how shared meanings can be expressed between autistic and non-autistic individuals, though they experience different perceptions of reality. Helps people interact meaningfully with autistic kids.



Special Brothers and Sisters: Stories and Tips for Siblings of Children with a Disability or Serious Illness (2005).

— Children explain in their own words what it is like to live with their brothers and sisters. Full of tips to help siblings cope with their feelings and other common issues.

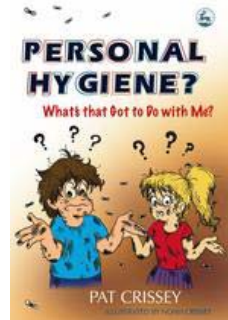

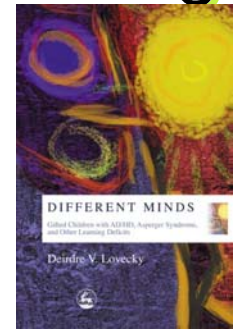

Different Minds: Gifted Children with AD/HD, Asperger Syndrome, and Other Learning Deficits (2004).

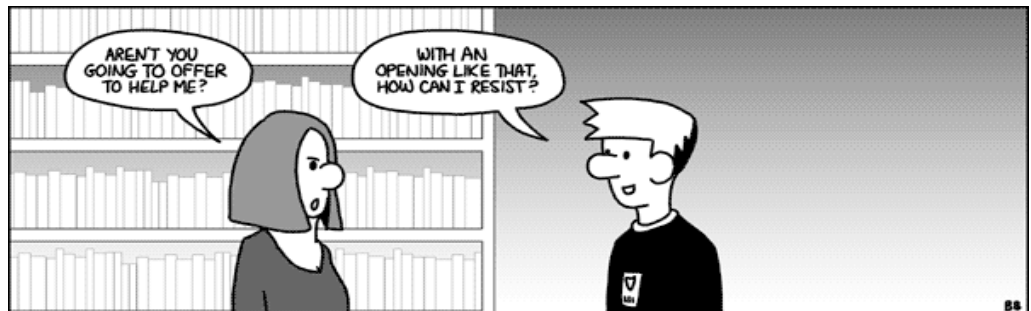
