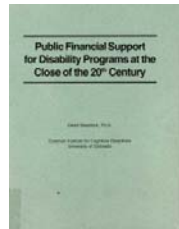

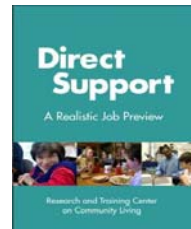

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Public Financial Support for Disability Programs at the Close of the 20th Century (2001)

— The book is an exploratory effort to quantitatively assess the level of public sector financial commitments for disability programs in the United States.



Direct Support: A Realistic Job Preview (2005)

— A realistic job preview (RJP) is a recruitment strategy used to give potential employees detailed and balanced information about job expectations, the employer, and the worksite, so they can make an informed decision about accepting a job offer from the employer. RJPs provide both positive and negative information that potential staff are unlikely to know. This RJP video illustrates the real, every-day work of direct support professionals. This video provides first-person stories and advice for people considering direct support as a career choice.

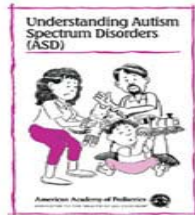

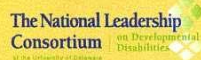
