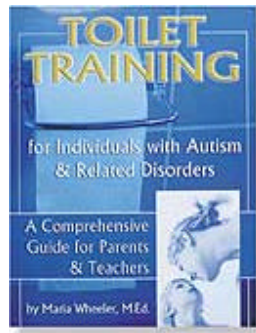
Words of Wisdom

Ten Things Every Child with Autism Wishes you Knew (2005).

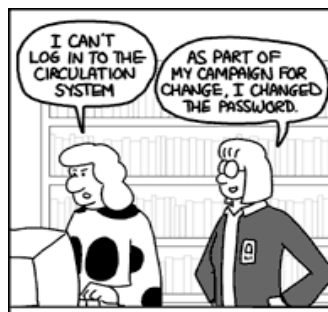

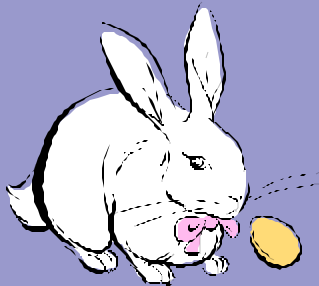
