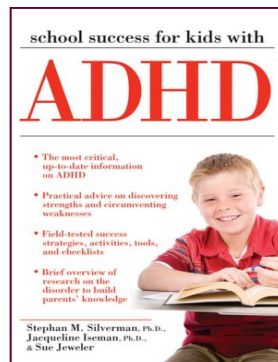

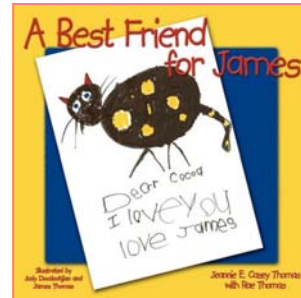

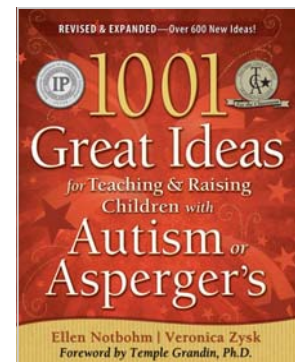
School Success for Kids with ADHD (2009)

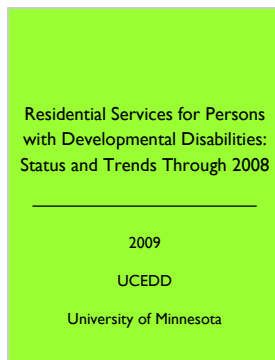

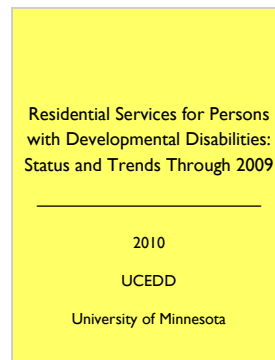

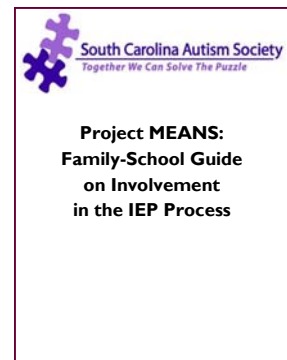
Residential Services for Persons with Developmental Disabilities (2009)

— “The National Residential Information Systems Project (RISP) of the Research and Training Center on Community Living began in 1977. This project gathers and reports statistics on people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (ID/DD) receiving residential and Medicaid-funded services in the United States. This report provides such statistics for the year ending June 30, 2008, as well as comparative statistics from earlier years.” Includes information on status and changes of state residential settings, IDD/DD residential services, and Medicaid-funded residential services.

Project MEANS: Family-School Guide on Involvement in the IEP Process (2010)

— “Parental involvement in the development of their children’s special education programs is absolutely essential for two basic reasons. First, state and federal special education laws require meaningful parent involvement... Second, researchers have shown that when parents of students with disabilities actively participate in their children’s special education programs students show greater achievement and fewer problem behaviors.”



ScienceDaily (Jan. 25, 2012) — “The odds of a major depressive episode are more than double for those working 11 or more hours a day compared to those working seven to eight hours a day, according to a report published in the Jan. 25 issue of the online journal PLoS ONE.

The authors, led by Marianna Virtanen of the Finnish Institute of Occupational Health and University College London, followed about 2000 middle aged British civil servants and found a robust association between overtime work and depression. This correlation was not affected when the analysis was adjusted for various possible confounders, including socio-demographics, lifestyle, and work-related factors. “
